DPM Dar, OIC chief stress urgency of Gaza ceasefire, humanitarian aid



JEDDAH: Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Senator Mohammad Ishaq Dar on Wednesday met with Secretary General of Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) Hissain Brahim Taha on the sidelines of the Open-Ended Extraordinary Meeting of OIC Executive Committee held here.

In the meeting, they discussed the situation in Gaza and Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (IIOJK), according to a press release.

The deputy prime minister discussed with the secretary general the ongoing genocide of the Palestinians and dire humanitarian situation in Gaza and the West Bank. They stressed the urgency of a ceasefire and unhindered supply of humanitarian assistance for the Palestinian people.

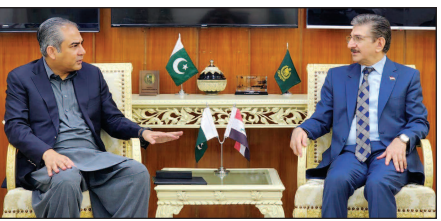
Deputy Prime Minister Ishaq Dar praised the OIC for its efforts for peace in the Middle East and expressed full support of Pakistan for its initiatives.

He appreciated the historic role of the OIC Contact Group on Jammu and Kashmir and the Special Envoy for Jammu and Kashmir for supporting the legitimate right of self-determination of the Kashmiris as reflected in various OIC resolutions and statements. Islamophobia, discrimination, and violence against Muslims were also discussed in the meeting. The deputy prime minister also lauded the appointment of OIC Secretary General's Special Envoy on Islamophobia and expressed the hope that the special envoy would steer the campaign to address this important issue.

Political sanity need of hour: Musadik

ISLAMABAD: Dr. Musadik Malik, Federal Minister for Petroleum, emphasized the need for political sanity and tolerance to tackle Pakistan's pressing issues. In an interview with a private news channel on Wednesday, he highlighted the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz's (PML-N) economic policies, which he claimed reduced inflation from 38% last year to 12%. Malik criticized the previous Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) regime, stating that it dragged the country into an economic crisis, which the current government has since recovered from. He accused the PTI's former chairman of perpetuating chaos and lawlessness since losing power. Malik specifically cited the May 9 events, where he alleged that PTI supporters desecrated martyrs' statues, as an example of this destructive behavior. APP

Pakistani pilgrims to get major facility at entering Iraq: visa fees waived, special flights announced



ISLAMABAD: Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi and Iraqi Ambassador Hamid Abbas Lafta announced a slew of measures aimed at easing travel restrictions and enhancing convenience to facilitate Pakistani pilgrims traveling to Iraq for Arbaeen. The landmark decisions were reached during a high-level meeting on Wednesday between the two sides who promised to make the journey smoother and more accessible for thousands of devotees. Both sides agreed that Pakistani pilgrims travel-

ing to Iraq for Arbaeen would no longer need to surrender their passports upon arrival. The meeting decided that the Pakistani pilgrims would be issued visas by the Iraqi Embassy, bypassing travel agents and the quota for Pakistan pilgrims would be increased.

It was also decided that special flights would be operating from Pakistan for Pakistani pilgrims while a new consulate will be opened in Karachi and both sides initiate a crackdown on agents charging excessive fees from pilgrims. The meeting also decided Visa waiver agreement on diplomatic and official passports while it was requested for the visa fee waiver for the ordinary pilgrims.

The decisions aim to provide equal facilities to Pakistani pilgrims, ensuring a hassle-free experience. Mohsin Naqvi thanked the Iraqi counterparts for their cooperation, while Ambassador Lafta extended an invitation to visit Iraq. APP

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif on Wednesday said that the federal government had allocated a historic development budget, in the current fiscal year, for the promotion of Information Technology and Telecom sectors.

besides promotion of business in this sector.

"Our vision envisaged access to smart phone by every individual, broadband internet facility to every household and facility of QR Code for all businesses," the press release quoted the prime minister as saying.

The delegation apprised the prime minister of GSMA role throughout the world, including Pakistan, over promotion of telecom services and expressed its keen interest in enhancing cooperation with the government in IT and

telecom sectors.

Meanwhile, Special Assistant to the Prime Minister on Power, Muhammad Ali, met with Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Wednesday. The prime minister warmly congratulated Muhammad Ali on his new appointment and offered his best wishes for success, PM Office Media Wing said in a press release. ISLAMABAD: Ambassador of Finland to Pakistan Hannu Ripatti called on Federal Minister for Finance & Revenue Senator Muhammad Aurangzeb at Finance Division on Wednesday. The Finance Minister welcomed Ambassador Ripatti and shared updates on Pakistan's economic performance, highlighting rise in tax collection, increased remittances, and foreign exchange reserves exceeding USD 9 billion. The Minister also discussed the successful conclusion of the 9-month SBA with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the recently finalized staff-level agreement for a 37-month IMF program. Additionally, the Minister



outlined ongoing initiatives, including end-to-end digitization in the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) to broaden the tax base, reforms in the energy sector, restructuring of state-owned enterprises (SOEs), and focus on export-led growth. Parliament converted a rule into law to stop floor crossing as envisaged in Constitution: Tarar

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Information, Broadcasting, National Heritage and Culture Attaullah Tarar said on Wednesday the Parliament was a supreme institution and through the Election (Amendment) Act it had converted a rule into a law to stop floor crossing as envisaged in the Constitution.

Addressing a press conference here, he said that Bilal Azhar Kayani of Muslim League (Nawaz) had presented the Election Act Amendment Bill in the National Assembly whereas Senator Tala Chaudhry moved it in the Senate. The minister said that the bill was passed by the National Assembly and the Senate by majority votes and became an act. He maintained that the Constitution and law were clear regarding floor crossing scourge and the new piece of legislation and further elaborate the matter.

According to the rules, he said an independent candidate had to join any party within three days after the announcement of official results of the elections.

The minister posed a question if a member's party could be changed after submitting an affidavit for joining a party. He said that two Supreme Court judges had raised important points and questioned that even after 15 days, the detailed decision was not issued by the majority judges in the bench.

Tarar said that the PTI-backed independents joined a party that did not exist in Parliament, how could that party get any seat as those seats were given on the principle of proportion.

Moreover, he said under proportional representation rules, it was binding on each political party to display its candidates lists for both women and minority seats.

He said one fails to fathom the logic and stance of the PTI leadership that they should not hold intra-party elections without any legal action or punishment on that account.

About the situation in Bangladesh, he said that the government and people of



Pakistan stood with the people of that country. He appreciated the determination and resilience of the Bangladeshi people for standing up against the regime marred by corruption.

Tarar said in Pakistan, the PTI founder chairman had compared himself with Sheikh Mujeeb eulogizing his stance in 1971 which Pakistanis considered as against national interests. PTI leaders during television talk shows claimed that

their leader was like Sheikh Mujeeb, he added.

Taking a jibe at the PTI founder chairman, he said if he did not take a U-turn, he cannot be called Imran Khan. He asked the PTI leaders if they had any faith, any sense of shame as now they were trying to build another narrative when Sheikh Mujeeb's daughter was thrown out of power by the people.

He said now when the statues of Sheikh Mujeeb were pulled down in Bangladesh, the PTI took a U-turn.

The PTI had created a narrative of Sheikh Mujeeb terming him a hero, posts were uploaded on its official social media accounts declaring him hero but after the fall of Mujeeb's statue PTI had changed its stance.

The minister said that the previous BD regime had created division in Bangladesh and the founding chairman PTI also believed in creating division in politics and society.

Tarar said that due to the degree of incon-

sistency in words and deeds, PTI founder chairman should be given the title of "King of U-turns".

He said that PTI founder chairman did use 'Islamic touch' for political gains and even was portrayed a 'sacred' personality in public gathering and nobody disowned those callous remarks.

Tarar suggested that Barrister Gohar should tell his party leader when he meets him in jail, he had termed Sheikh Mujeeb a hero, but now the party narrative has changed.

To a question, he said the problem in Bangladesh was not economic conditions, it was the problem of division, hatred and quota system.

He expressed the hope that normalcy would return in Bangladesh and its journey towards prosperity would continue. The minister questioned when Sheikh Mujeeb's narrative was being made by the PTI founder chairman, did he not know where his daughter was seeking help from.

He said it was his faith that no political party or leader was bigger than Pakistan, and slogans of "Imran Nahin tau Pakistan Nahin" exposed the mentality of PTI followers.

Answering a question, he said that matters have progressed amicably with Jamaat-e-Islami and formidable progress has been made in yesterday's talks. He said that the government had sent some points to the JI which will be discussed today.

Tarar said what Jamaat-e-Islami's demand actually was the agenda of the government. "We also want the electricity bills tariff to be reduced", he remarked.

The minister said that now the PTI founder chairman has demanded that a refrigerator should be provided in his prison cell. "His Highness has decreed that when water has been brought from the refrigerator in the prison from the superintendent's room, it gets hot on the way." APP

Lessons from the east

The sudden resignation of Sheikh Hasina, prime minister of Bangladesh, has sent shockwaves through many struggling democracies. Her departure to a safe location in India on a military helicopter, coupled with the military's refusal to grant her a final address to the nation, demonstrates a theatrical shift in Bangladesh's political landscape. The crisis in Bangladesh escalated from student-led demonstrations against a quota system for government jobs. The situation rapidly deteriorated into violent clashes, resulting in over 200 deaths last month. This turmoil, combined with economic challenges – GDP growth dropping to 3.78 per cent from 7.0 per cent the previous year and inflation hovering around 10 per cent – set the stage for military intervention. When people discuss the 'Asian Tigers', they often refer to Hong Kong, Singapore, South Korea, and Taiwan – countries that experienced rapid growth between the 1960s and 1990s. Recently, Bangladesh seemed poised to join this group. However, the current economic and political instability has dimmed these prospects. For Pakistan, the developments in Bangladesh are a stark warning. Pakistan, already lagging behind Bangladesh in several metrics, must heed these lessons. Pakistan faces its own set of challenges: inflation around 12 per cent, a lack of jobs, and a significant portion of its youth seeking better opportunities abroad. Those left behind are frustrated, grappling with a polarized political landscape. The politics of polarization is not just a looming threat; it is a reality. Provinces are at loggerheads, and individuals in power use politics of hate and resentment to maintain their relevance. This needs to stop. According to the latest Pakistan Economic Survey for 2023-24, over 13.53 million Pakistanis have officially migrated to work in more than 50 countries by April 2024. This places Pakistan in the seventh position among the leading countries of migrant origin, according to the International Migration Report of 2022.

When young talent leaves the country in such significant numbers, it is a clear indication that the country has failed its youth. For additional perspective, consider the contrasting situation in India, where young Indians are increasingly choosing to stay and build their

futures at home. This stark difference highlights the challenges Pakistan faces in providing opportunities and stability for its younger generations. A seemingly small event, like the student-led protests against a quota system for government jobs in Bangladesh, can rapidly escalate into a revolution or even lead to the toppling of a government. In Pakistan, we are experiencing socio-political tensions across almost all provinces. One single incident could spark nationwide protests, putting countless lives at risk. The people of Pakistan are losing patience. If they do not see meaningful change in the next few years, we might witness scenes similar to those in Bangladesh or the uprisings of the Arab Spring. In Pakistan, we're already witnessing the erosion of the separation of powers, with state institutions often at daggers drawn. This ongoing conflict exposes deep fault lines within our governance structures, undermining the integrity and effectiveness of our institutions. Such a breakdown not only hampers the functioning of the government but also erodes public trust in the state's ability to govern fairly and effectively. Identity politics is another significant threat to the country's stability. When segments of society feel marginalized or sidelined over extended periods, it breeds resentment and unrest. Provinces such as Balochistan, for instance, have long felt neglected and marginalized. This sense of exclusion has already led to significant unrest, and if not addressed, has the potential to escalate further.

For too long has Pakistan has focused on pointing fingers at its neighbours for its instability. It is time for the country to take responsibility for its own shortcomings. Internal conflicts among provinces and divisive politics have weakened the nation. What happened in Bangladesh serves as a reminder that Pakistan needs to revamp its structures within the power corridors and work in unity for socio-economic and political development. The likelihood of future undemocratic interventions in Pakistan is uncertain. While a formal takeover seems improbable in the near term, unforeseen circumstances could change the dynamics. Observing recent developments in Bangladesh, where unexpected political shifts have occurred, it becomes clear that anything is possible. As former US president Harry Truman aptly remarked, "Politics is a fascinating game". In other words, expect endless possibilities in the world political arena.

Self-reflection is crucial for Pakistan. It is imperative for the nation to learn from Bangladesh's crisis and implement necessary reforms to prevent a similar fate. An essential step towards national healing and unity would be to address historical grievances Bangladesh may hold in relation to the 1971 war. This could pave the way for a fresh start and improved relations between the two countries. And help us move on for self-healing.

Regulating party elections

Quaid-e-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah remained the president of the All India Muslim League from 1937 to 1943. Abul Kalam Azad was the president of the All India Congress from 1936 to 1946. Syed Maududi headed the Jamaat-e-Islami almost throughout his life. Founding leaders usually remain the head of a political party and are "reelected" because in South Asia, people rally behind leaders and subscribe to their ideologies. Pakistan owes its existence to Jinnah, who created it against all odds. The pivotal position of political parties in modern liberal democracies is well known. These parties are organized on common ideals. People vote for them on the basis of their programmes. Political parties help form public opinions on important issues that determine state policy. The ultimate goal of a political party is to gain power through ballot and deliver on its programme.

The entire constitutional scheme is built around the formation, membership, functioning and voting for political parties to give it a representative character. The formation of political parties, with the penumbra of rights, is therefore elevated to a fundamental right in almost all constitutions. These rights are also recognized in international charters as part of civil and political rights. Pakistan's constitution recognized this basic right in Article 17. The 1956 and 1962 constitutions also recognized this right to form and join political parties. However, the original right, as guaranteed in the constitution of 1973, was qualified through the fourth amendment (1975) by adding more restrictions on the formation and existence of political parties, including restrictions in the interest of Pakistan's integrity and sovereignty.

The federal government was given the power to prohibit or dissolve a political party subject to an SC verdict passed in a reference by the federal government. These expressions were not defined in the constitution. Additionally, a political party was obligated to account for funds. This restriction was added in the context of the cold war as parties were funded by the erstwhile communist Soviet Union. Funds and aid from the 'free world' were seen with favour. The Political Parties Act, 1962 was also amended, and the power to prohibit and dissolve a political party lay with the federal government. It was a dangerous tool given in the hands of sitting governments, which could silence their political opponents and dissenting voices by prohibiting and dissolving political parties. The law was further amended to make it compulsory for political parties to register with the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP). Yet in another attempt to control political parties in the political arena, intra-party elections were made a condition, and a certificate from the ECP had to be obtained to become eligible for a common election symbol for elections. This gave the commission the power to either refuse to accept or instead raise a dispute against such intra-party elections and then judge the said elections in the absence of an express adjudicating power under the law. This latter part of the law was added through the Legal Framework Order of 2002 in Article 17 by adding clause 4 with the objective of excluding two main political parties from the electoral process. The Political Order, 2002 was promulgated to incorporate these Machiavellian provisions. Articles 11 and 17 of the Political Order, 2002 provided the legal framework. Article 17 was substituted through the 18th Amendment in 2010, and the requirement of holding intra-party elections was done away with. The omission of the said con-

stitutional provision, having been challenged through a petition, was maintained by the SC in the 2015 district bar association case. It was held that intra-party elections were not sine qua non for a democratic setup (paragraph 117).

In an earlier attempt to control political parties, by amending the Political Parties Act, 1962 through various enactments during the martial law regime, restrictions were placed by forcing parties to register with the commission. The SC, in its historic judgment (1988) on a petition of the late Benazir Bhutto, struck down the requirement of registration made subject to the satisfaction of the ECP that was sine qua non for participation in elections and held that leaving discretion with the commission "be but an unreasonable restriction as it fails to provide a remedy against the exercise of discretion in putting to an end the existence of a political party in the context of rights guaranteed by the constitution".

In another judgment (1989), the vires of Section 21 of the Representation Act were challenged wherein political parties were omitted from eligible persons to obtain an electoral symbol for elections. The SC struck down that provision also and held that the right to obtain a symbol was part of the rights guaranteed under Article 17. The right to a symbol for elections is also connected with the constitutional right to vote as guaranteed under Article 51 of the constitution. Lawmakers overlooked the constitutional change and incorporated Article 17 of the Election Order in the form of Section 215 of the Election Act. There is no entry in the Federal Legislative List in relation to political parties. The law thus enacted can only draw its constitutional backing from Article 17 of the constitution. The ECP does not conduct intra-party elections. Section 209 of the Election Act does not confer jurisdiction upon the commission to decide an intra-party election dispute before giving the certificate.

In the absence of an express conferment of jurisdiction as required under Article 175(2) of the constitution and there being a bar under Article 225 of the constitution, the ECP cannot interfere in, dispute and decide an intra-party election matter and refuse the election symbol to a political party. It would become a party to the lis and a judge in the cause.

Political parties are like private clubs. Intra-party election disputes are to be decided by the courts of ordinary jurisdiction. The provisions of Sections 209 and 215 of the Elections Act are ultra vires and against the constitution's basic features. The commission, by denying the election symbol to a political party on the basis of intra-party elections, would be failing in its duty to hold free, fair and transparent elections.

In the Marbury v Madison case, the Judiciary Act was struck down in the absence of a formal challenge thereto. Vires of Section 8-B of the Political Parties Act were challenged in defence as a legal objection to question the jurisdiction of the ECP. The Supreme Court upheld the objection and declared Section 8-B ultra vires of the constitution. Judges take oath to uphold the constitution and not laws.

After committing an historic wrong in the Tamizuddin case (1955), CJ Munir, in the twilight of his career observed in the 1958 noon case that "if the country is ruined by the wrong choice of the prime minister, the responsibility for the disaster is that of the people and not of a judge". CJ Marshall's observation in McCulloch v Maryland is still relevant: "We must never forget that it is the constitution we are expounding". There is no harm in admitting mistakes.

History of Pakistan

Under the constitution there is a formal division between the judiciary and the executive branches of government. The judiciary consists of the Supreme Court, the provincial high courts, and (under their jurisdiction and supervision) district courts that hear civil cases and sessions courts that hear criminal cases. There is also a magistracy that deals with cases brought by the police. The district magistrate (who, as deputy commissioner, also controls the police) hears appeals from magistrates under him; appeals may go from him to the sessions judge. The

Supreme Court is a court of record. It has original, appellate, and advisory jurisdictions and is the highest court in the land. At the time of independence, Pakistan inherited legal codes and acts that have remained in force, subject to amendment. The independence of the judiciary has been tested at times, most notably in 2007, when Pres. Pervez Musharraf replaced the chief justice and several other Supreme Court justices who challenged his constitutional legitimacy. Pressure from lawyers' groups and opposition leaders led to the justices' reinstatement in

2009. The judicial system also has a religious dimension; a reorientation to Islamic tenets and values was designed to make legal redress inexpensive and accessible to all persons. A complete code of Islamic laws was instituted, and the Federal Shariat Court, a court of Islamic law (Shar'ah), was set up in the 1980s; the primary purpose of this court is to ascertain whether laws passed by parliament are congruent with the precepts of Islam. The Shar'ah system operates alongside the more secular largely Anglo-Saxon system and legal tradition.

The role of Islam in the political and cultural unification of Pakistan has been controversial. Some factions have argued that Islamic ideology is the only cement that can bind together the country's culturally diverse peoples. Opposing factions have argued that the insistence on Islamic ideology, in opposition to regional demands expressed in secular and cultural idiom, has alienated regional groups and eroded national unity.

How to get through with cancer diagnosis?

A lot of people can experience shock and get triggered upon coming to know about their cancer diagnosis especially when they are not expecting it. The National Cancer Institute (NCI) estimates that in the United States alone, there were around 1,806,590 new cases in 2020.

Dany Bell, a specialist advisor on treatment and advocacy at the Macmillan Cancer Support in the

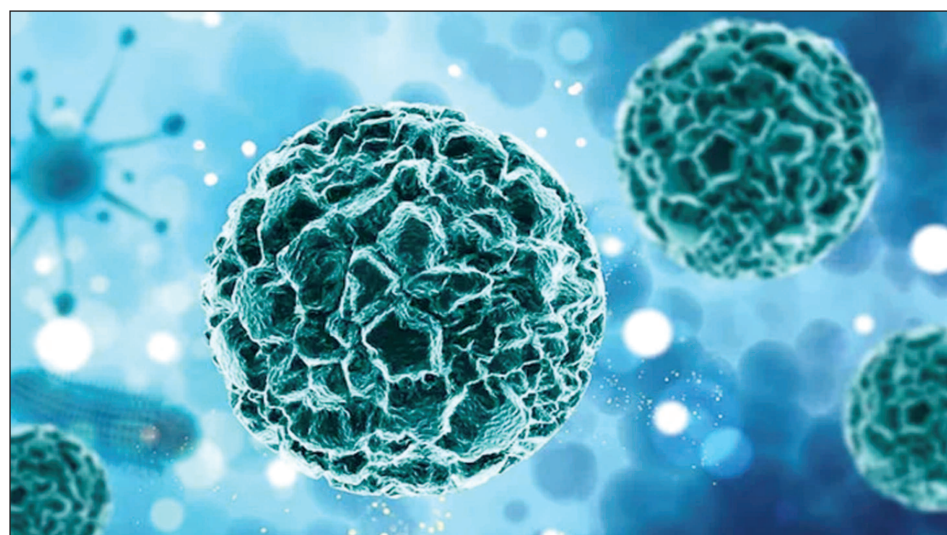

United Kingdom, told Medical News Today: "Being diagnosed with cancer can be a big shock, even if you already suspected you might have it." "Cancer is a word that can stir up many fears and emotions," added Bell, "but making sure you fully understand your diagnosis can help you feel more in control of the situation." As the subject of a cancer diagnosis is always a heavily loaded one, so communicating with a doc-

tor might feel challenging. It might be difficult for both the person and the doctor to communicate efficiently.

Dr Ann O'Mara, head of palliative care research in the NCI's Division of Cancer Prevention, told Medical News Today that there is no magical recipe for success in these cases. However, she said that open communication is very important to ensure that people get the information they need and that the doctor knows how they are coping with the diagnosis.

"If the communication with that physician is causing you to be more stressed out, you have to communicate that to the physician," she said. Moreover, after receiving a cancer diagnosis, symptoms of depression and anxiety are often a natural outcome. A strong support network is also important to be able to count on.

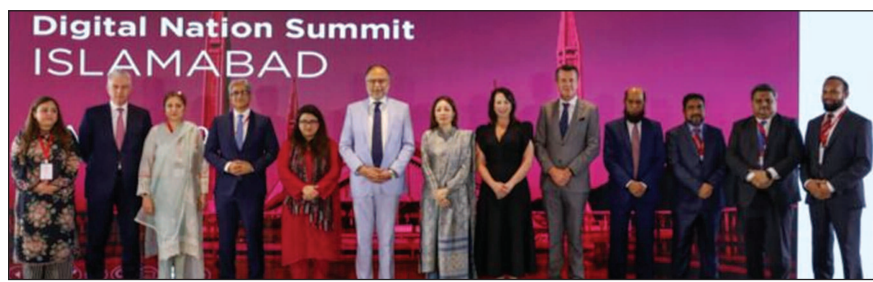

GSMA highlights Pakistan's digital progress, potential to spur accelerated economic growth

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan is poised to unlock its economic potential through accelerated digital transformation, according to a new report, "Realising Pakistan's Aspiration to become a Digital Nation," launched by the GSMA at its Digital Nation Summit. The report underscores the country's significant strides in mobile connectivity and smartphone adoption while outlining a clear path to maximise these gains for the benefit of its citizens. However, achieving these aspirations will require concrete action and reforms. The GSMA's supporting report revealed a substantial increase in mobile broadband coverage in Pakistan, with 81% of the adult population now in areas covered by 3G or 4G networks, up from just 15% in 2010. Additionally, smartphone ownership reached 63% by the end of 2023. However, only 23% of

the population subscribes to mobile internet services, underlining the scale of the challenge to connect the unconnected.

The report reveals the blueprint to address these challenges: infrastructure, innovation, data governance, security, and people. These five pillars are the foundation for a thriving digital nation. The report emphasises the importance of financial reforms and strategic initiatives. Recommendations include eliminating the 15% Advance Income Tax and the 19.5% sales tax on mobile services, addressing high spectrum prices, and introducing a smartphone financing policy to improve access to affordable devices. Additionally, the GSMA advocates for a rational approach to spectrum pricing ahead of the planned 5G spectrum auction in early 2025.

Julian Gorman, Head of APAC at the GSMA, said: "Pakistan has the potential to realise its aspiration to become a Digital Nation. First it must scale its connected population to

strengthen its basic digital economy enabler. Then by adopting a whole-of-government approach and investing in the five key pillars of infrastructure, innovation, data governance, security, and people, Pakistan can unlock its full digital potential, improve the lives of its citizens, and drive sustainable economic growth. The GSMA is committed to supporting the country's digital journey and working in partnership to build a connected, inclusive, and prosperous future."

However, achieving these goals requires addressing significant regulatory and fiscal challenges. While market reforms are hoped for, without changes to the regulatory framework and a reduction in tax, progress will be limited, and the substantial usage gap will remain difficult to bridge.

Adding to the momentum, the upcoming edition of M360 Asia Pacific in Seoul this October will see the release of the first pan-Asia Pacific Digital Nation Report, which will compare the digital progress of 20 nations across the Asia Pacific region. This event follows the recently published Mobile Economy APAC 2024 Report, which highlights key trends and insights shaping the mobile industry in the Asia Pacific region.

The report provides valuable data and analysis on the growth trajectory and economic impact of mobile technology, reinforcing the strategic importance of digital advancement in Pakistan and beyond.

ISLAMABAD: Ambassador Hameed Ajibaiye Opeleyeru, Permanent Observer of the OIC Mission to the United Nations, has reiterated the Organization of Islamic Cooperation's (OIC) commitment to ensuring the resolution of the Kashmir dispute in line with international law and resolutions of the United Nations.

Speaking at an event marking the fifth anniversary of India's unilateral actions in Indian illegally occupied Jammu and Kashmir, Opeleyeru said the OIC has adopted a plan of action to expedite the resolution of the crisis. Equally ominous is the fact that this crisis that has historically threatened peace, stability and security of South Asia. Opeleyeru expressed solidarity with the people of Kashmir in their struggle for self-determination, emphasizing that the OIC recognizes their just and legitimate struggle. "There is no doubt that the United Nations has been seized of the question of Jammu and Kashmir since the Security Council Resolution 47 of 21 April 1948," he added. Accordingly, and in line with the principle of subsidiarity, the OIC, as a

regional organization of 57 member states, recognizes the just and legitimate struggle of the people of Jammu and Kashmir to defend their right to self-determination, through exploring all legal, political and diplomatic avenues, leading to the realization of the national aspirations of the people of the Indian occupied Jammu and Kashmir.

He called on UN member states to encourage the implementation of relevant UN Security Council resolutions on the peaceful settlement of the Kashmir dispute.

Other speakers, including Ambassador Munir Akram of Pakistan, Dr. Ghulam Nabi Fai, and Senator Lt. General (rt'd) Abdul Qayyum, also emphasized the need for international action to resolve the Kashmir dispute. They highlighted the similarities between the Kashmir and Palestine conflicts and the importance of implementing UN resolutions to bring about lasting peace. The event was held to mark the fifth anniversary of India's revocation of Article 370, which granted special status to Jammu and Kashmir. APP

ECP files review petition against reserved seats verdict

ISLAMABAD: The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) on Wednesday moved a review petition to the Supreme Court against the verdict regarding the reserved seats.

It has been said in the petition that the Commission has not misinterpreted any legal and judicial decision, and prayed the top court to review its verdict dated July 12.

The review petition stated that the ECP has performed its responsibility according to the Constitution and law and has not misinterpreted any legal or judicial decision. The Supreme Court's decision has been implemented in letter and spirit, it added.

The ECP said that it is a constitutional right to file a review of a court decision, adding that the court cannot interfere in Article 218 of the Constitution.

It said that on misinterpretation of the Constitution, the matter should be remanded back to the constitutional body. The decision has been implemented to the extent of 39 members of the PTI, it said.

It should be mentioned that the Supreme Court in its judgment had ordered to give the reserved seats to the PTI while giving a decision on the appeal filed by the Sunni Ittehad Council (SIC). APP
